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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Next Year's Course

Based on your comments from the course critiques it would appear that most of you were satisfied with the program presented in Winnipeg. I say this with some reservations because only twenty-five critiques were received. Be that as it may, I am confident that these critiques plus your suggestions from the end of the course review session will ensure that we (Dan Potvin, Dick Malott, Dan Mackay, Marce Richard) and myself will be able to put together an excellent program for 1999.

Once again we plan to balance classroom presentations with field trips. In order to gain full benefit from our trips we have arranged for guest speakers to give us the background on the various museums we are scheduled to visit. And what field trips they will be! Our day in Saint John for example will feature the recently opened NB Museum which is located in a downtown mall (if you haven't seen Ted Brother's example in Nanaimo, here's your chance to see a biggie!) Similarly our trip to King's Landing will be a behind the scenes look at their operation presented by expert staff.

We will have lecturers from foreign shores and

from close to home and we expect to cover everything from "how to set a 3 Ton Lorry on a pad" to "how to work that digital camera to get pictures on your collection record". We will be quartered in the new officers' barracks and I can guarantee they are really comfortable. The VP tells me we are going to have an "army" formal dining-in to counteract the "air force" flavour at the '98 course. I don't know quite what he means.

A number of you (about 20) could not be accommodated at the conference in Winnipeg, and for this we are sorry. We are making different arrangements for future courses so that this situation does not happen again. However, if you don't get your registration in on time, don't be mad at us. We have a cut-off date for a very good reason.

The Millennium Project

We sent out more than 30 letters across Canada to two levels of government and all veterans, cadets, Girl Guides and Scouting organizations to let them know what we are thinking and when we plan to start. We have had very positive responses from more than 24 of the addressees so far and we are very hopeful for the future.

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Regrettably, our chief supporter in DND, LGen Dallaire, has been sent on sick leave for an indefinite period, so we are going it alone at this point. We hope he gets well soon and returns to give us his needed guidance and support. We are investigating

VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Third Annual US Army Museum Training Course

The Third Annual US Army Museum Training Course was held in St. Louis, Missouri from 26 April to 1 May 1998. The course, hosted by the U.S. Army Engineer Museum based at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, is advertised as the world's largest annual professional military museum Training Course. Like our own course their course consists of lectures, demonstrations, seminars and workshops. It is designed to accommodate several disciplines in the museum profession and to facilitate the exchange of information regarding their museum policies and procedures. Nearly one quarter of the participants come from outside of the Army and the federal government. This includes a group of foreign military museum representatives as well as some unique attendees such as the local owner of Planet Hollywood which incorporates in its restaurant motif, movie memorabilia some of which is military.

Generally speaking their course is the primary training resource for museum professionals employed in any military museum. Featured topics focus on important Army (and other) service museum problems, needs and changes.

The course is taught by museum specialists, eg. curators, archivists, law professors, conservators and collections specialists from the Department of Defence and the private sector.

The program for this five day course was a mix of lectures/presentations and field trips. Following opening remarks by MGen Flowers, Commanding General, U.S. Army Engineer Centre and Fort Leonard Wood and by BGen Mountcastle, the Chief of Military History, representatives from foreign museums were given the opportunity to make a brief presentation. It was at this time that I gave an overview of OMMC Inc. and invited any interested museums or individuals to join us and given the exchange rate it was quite a bargain!

The day one program was a series of lectures, which concentrated on philosophical and conceptual issues pertaining to museums and exhibit design in the 21st Century. Topics covered included, Conceptualization and Exhibit Design, Conservation Issues in Exhibit Design, Interactive Exhibits, Commercial Exhibit Design and Exhibits for large/diverse audiences.

Day two began with two lectures focusing on the technical aspects of exhibit design. The first session on lighting techniques provided in-depth information on traditional, contemporary, and future trends and techniques in museum lighting. The second session dealt with labelling techniques and showed us how we might use existing equipment to develop desktop publishing programs, thus allowing enhanced in-house ability to improve their role in signage, publications, and didactic labelling.

The major field trip of the course was made to Fort Leonard Wood on day three. Like our trip to Shilo, this was a two hour drive to the home of the

US Army Engineers. Our visit included a tour of their state of the art museum which featured as an annex a collection of restored WWII barrack blocks.

The focus for day four was on conservation and accessions. We had a fascinating presentation by the owner of Planet Hollywood who showed how he combined exhibits of Hollywood memorabilia with the restaurant business. We looked at his use of space and exhibit design.

This presentation was followed by a demonstration of the new Army Museum Information System (AMIS). This in turn led into a session which provided attendees with an overview of the virtual museum and web page design.

The next three sessions concerned materiel culture. Presentations were made by experts on air and ground macro-artifacts and finally a session in micro-artifacts.

The last day of the course featured an all day tour of various city museums. This tour ran concurrently with their Army Museum Certification Team Training (their museums only).

All in all this was a well organized and run course. The presentations were excellent and the tours and museum visits complimented the lessons learned. I strongly recommend OMMC Inc. continue our association with the Centre of US Army Military History and participate in their annual Museum Training Course.

This award is presented annually to individuals who have supported and given back to the community and are deserving of recognition.

Support - Ortona Veterans

During Christmas Week 1943 units of the 1st Canadian Infantry Division supported by tanks of the Three Rivers Regiment fought the 1st German Parachute Division in Ortona on the Adriatic coast of Italy. The bloody week-long battle was the culmination of a Canadian thrust that began at the Moro River which resulted in 1375 Canadians killed. A public appeal is now in progress to allow a group of 30 veterans of the battle to return to Ortona where it is planned they will have a dinner of reconciliation with veterans of the 1st German Parachute Division on Christmas Eve. The dinner is planned to take place in the Church of Santa Maria di Constantinopoli where Canadian troops had Christmas dinner during the fighting fifty-five years ago.

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and CTV have confirmed they will cover the dinner.

Donations may be sent postage-free to Peter Goldring, MP, House of Commons, Ottawa, Ontario, K1A 0A6, made payable to "Three Rivers Regiment Veterans Association". All donations will be acknowledged with grateful thanks. (P.S. As of 7 December 1998, \$170,000.00 had been raised to send the 30

veterans to Ortona and to construct a memorial in Ortona for the Canadian dead.)
